What is universal health coverage?



Universal Health Coverage means that all people can use health services, where and when they need them, without experiencing financial hardship.

Ensuring no one is left behind



Countries can track progress towards universal health coverage by measuring:

- financial protection
- access to health services.











Financial protection



No one should have to choose between health care and other basic needs.

Financial protection means a Europe free of impoverishing out-of-pocket payments.












Incidence of catastrophic spending on health and out-of-pocket share of total spending



Access to health services



This means the right care, in the right place, at the right time – every time.

It ensures there is no unmet need for health care.











Primary health care for UHC



- Strong primary health care meets 70 - 80% of people's health needs throughout their lives.
- It is a cost-effective path towards UHC.

Unified appointment systems, applications for patient reminders, waiting list management



- 2019: UN High-Level Meeting on Universal Health Coverage












Regional challenges
